





Philippines, 2000-2022







The facility, which will expand the current Klinika Bernardo located in Cuhan, will be built near the town plaza in Novaliches. It will serve as a diagnostic. treatment and reterral facility for male patients with sexually related diseases.

The city government said it will be compped with HIV testing facilities and will be operated by medical and clinical personnel of the city health department trained peer educators will also be available to provide free counseling to clients.

City health officials said the sundown chrise - which will operate from 3 p.m. to

Rolly Cruz of the city health department said the city government is investing some P15 million for its HIV/AIDS control program in 2014.

Last year, the city government passed an ordinance that will penalize employers who will discriminate against employees who have HIV infection or AIDS

The law seeks to prevent discrimination. among employees or applicants for employment who are "perceived, suspected or confirmed to have infected with HIV."

Based on the measure, the licenses or permits of employers or businesses found guilty of committing discriminatory acts will be revoked, said the ordinance.

The ordinance also prohibits employers from requiring applicants or current employees from taking HIV tests, adding that "employers cannot simply equate HIV with disability."

It defines discrimination as any act that may degrade human dignity, including unequal treatment of employees or applicants perceived, suspected, or confirmed to have infected with HIV .- Janvic Mateo





IMPLEMENTING RULES AND REGULATIONS OF ORDINANCE NO SP-2210, S-2013

"AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING ALL FORMS OF DISCRIMINATION OF WORKERS PERCEIVED OR SUSPECTED OR EVEN FOUND TO BE POSITIVELY INFECTED WITH HUMAN IMMUNODEFIENCY VIRUS (HIT) IN WORKFLACES WITHIN THE TERRITORIAL JURISDICTION OF QUEZON CITY"

RULE I Preliminary Provisions

Article 1. TITLE. This implementing rules and regulations shall be known as the 'Implementing Rules and Regulations of the Anti-discrimination within the Workplace against Persons Perceived or Suspected or Foundto be Infected with HIV and AIDS."

Article 2. PURPOSE- Pursuant to Section 8 of Ordinance No SP-2210, S-2013, these Implementing Rules and Regulations (IRR) is hereby promulgated as a principle and prescribed guidelines, procedures and standards for implementation of Ordinance No SP-2210. S-2013 to facilitate combiance thereto and achieve the intent of the Ordinance.

Article 3. COVERAGE. These Rules and Regulations shall apply to all natural and juridical person, including their representatives and/or agents, operating within the territorial jurisdiction of Quezon City, whether public or private, who undertakes, recruitment, hiring, promoting, training, compensation or any other term. condition or privilege of a person who it an employee or applicant. It shall cover all applicants and employees, regardless of their employment staus, including trainees of the aforementioned entities, who are perceived, suspected or confirmed to be infected with HIV or AIDS. Provided, further. That the protection, rights and privileges provided for under this Ordinance may also extend to the worker's immediate families and dependents. declared for the purpose of employment benefit, with respect to their access to and benefit from prevention, treatment, care and support measures, their protection and privacy including confidentiality of their HIV-related information and their entitlement to health services.

RULE II Definition and Construction

Article 4. DEFINITION OF TERMS- For purposes of this Implementing Rules and Regulations, the following words, terms and phrases shall mean and be constructed as follows pursuant to Republic Act No 8504:

- 4.1 Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) -A condition based on signs, symptoms, infections, and cancers associated with the deficiency of the immune system that stems from infection with HIV.
- 4.2 Compulsory HIV Testing An HIV testing of a person attended by the lack of consent lack of consent of the parents or legal guardian when said person is a minor or is insane; or use of physical force, intimidation or any other form of compulsion.





Quezon City has taken strong DIFFERENCE and bold action to understand and respond to its epidemic Advocacy linked to strategic information has led to increasing local investment, with city administrators leading and funding the HIV response. The 2011 Quezon City Investment Plan for AIDS aims to reach 80-90% of key populations with HIV prevention coverage annually by 2015.

The Sundown Clinic is perhaps the city's most innovative programme. 
