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CHAPTER 1. INTRODUCTION

Mongolia has undertaken an assessment of spending on national HIV/AIDS response since 2012. The first National AIDS Spending Assessment (NASA) report focusing on expenditures in 2010-2011 was published and disseminated to decision-makers and relevant governmental and non-governmental organizations (NGO) in 2012. The current report summarizes the findings of the third NASA. Unlike the previous two assessments conducted in 2012 and 2014, which estimated biennial expenditures, the current exercise assessed total spending on national HIV/AIDS response for a period of three years (2014, 2015 and 2016).

1.1 Goal

The third NASA aimed at estimating the total expenditure on national HIV/AIDS response in 2014-2016 in Mongolia.

1.2 Objectives

1.2.1 To estimate the total expenditure on national HIV/AIDS response by financing sources, financing agents, providers of services, spending categories, production factor and beneficiary populations;

1.2.2 To process and analyze data for reporting purposes.

CHAPTER 2. ASSESSMENT METHODOLOGY

2.1 Estimation of total expenditure

Top down costing, thereby total costs are split further and allocated downwards to various cost units in order to estimate unit cost, was used for estimating the total expenditure on national HIV/AIDS response:

The assessment was not confined to health costs (including prevention and medical care), and included costs associated with improving legal environment, research and development, and human resource development.

2.2 AIDS spending categories

HIV/AIDS response activities are classified into the following 8 categories:

- ASC 1. Prevention
- ASC 2. Care and treatment
- ASC 3. Orphans and vulnerable children
- ASC 4. Programme management and administration
- ASC 5. Human resources
- ASC 6. Enabling environment
- ASC 7. HIV-related research

Expenditures on national HIV/AIDS response are classified according to the following 6 categories:

- 1. Financing sources(FS)
- 2. Financing agents(FA)
- 3. Providers of services(PS)
- 4. Production factors (PF)
- 5. AIDS spending categories(ASC)
- 6. Beneficiary populations(BP)

Further, beneficiary populations are classified into the following 6 main groups:

- 1. People living with HIV
- 2. Most-at-risk populations
- 3. Other key populations
- 4. Specific “accessible” populations
- 5. General population
- 6. Non-targeted interventions

2.3 Data collection

A total of 77 governmental, non-governmental, private and international organizations engaged in HIV/AIDS response were enlisted, and data was collected from 55 of them. Additionally, selected data from 2003-2014 National Health Accounts developed by the Center for Health Development was used in the current assessment.

2.4 Data processing

Data was processed using EXCEL software.

CHAPTER 3. BACKGROUND

3.1 Current state of HIV/AIDS epidemic in Mongolia

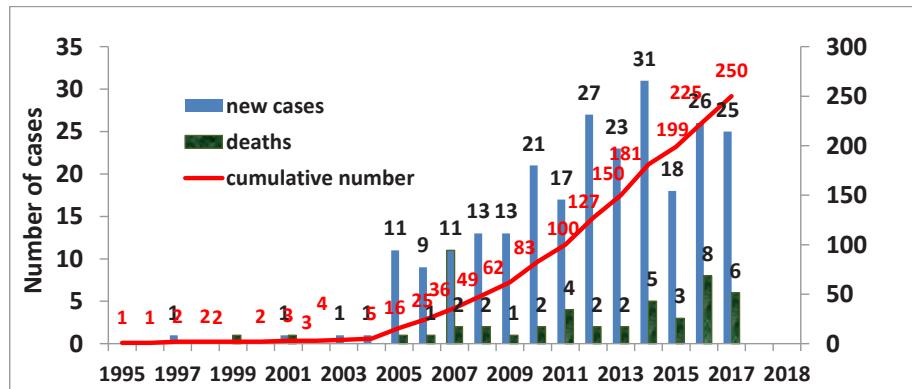


Figure 3.1. Cumulative number of reported HIV cases and deaths (1995-2017)

Since the reporting of the first HIV case in 1995, a total of 250 cases were reported as of December 31, 2017 in Mongolia (Figure3.1).

The latest estimation of HIV cases was undertaken by AIDS/STI Surveillance Unit of the National Center for Communicable Diseases (NCCD) using *Spectrum v5.51 Beta18* software based on UNAIDS methodology in March 2017. According to this estimation there were 575 persons living with HIV in 2017 in Mongolia, and the number could reach 648 in 2020.

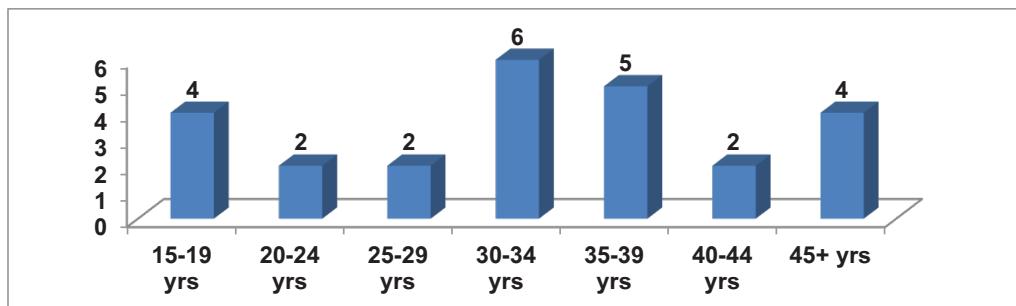


Figure 3.2. Age structure of reported HIV cases

Of 25 new HIV cases reported in 2017, three were females and 22 were males. In terms of sexual orientation of male cases 14(66.6%) were homosexual, 5(22.7%) were bisexual and 3(10.7%) were heterosexual. Eleven cases (44%) were 30-39 years old (Figure3.2).

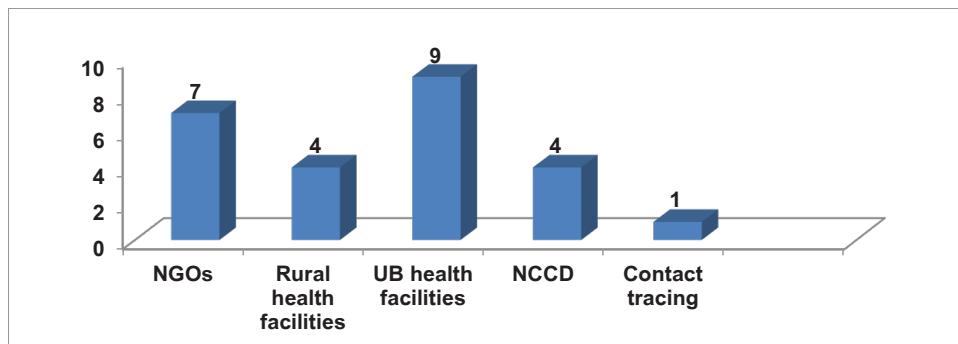


Figure 3.3. HIV cases by the type of reporting service providers

Of 25 HIV cases reported in 2017, eighteen cases (72%) were diagnosed by health facilities (Figure3.3), and 11cases (44%) had AIDS. Eleven of the cases

were detected by active surveillance (HIV campaign organized by NGOs, and contact tracing and active case finding organized by NCCD), 10 cases were detected as a result of provider-initiated HIV testing (conducted in accordance with Provider-Initiated HIV Testing Guidelines approved by the Health Minister's Order No. 191 of 2012), and 4 cases were detected among those undergoing voluntary HIV counseling and testing.

Six of 41 HIV-related deaths were reported in 2017, and 3 of 6 fatal cases had AIDS at the time of diagnosis. Almost all (92%) of 25 HIV/AIDS cases diagnosed in 2017 received anti-retroviral treatment (ART), and viral suppression was achieved in 92% of treated cases.

In total, 21 children were born to HIV-infected mothers. Of them, 6 were born in 2017.

There were 33 foreigners diagnosed with HIV in Mongolia, including 8 cases from Russian Federation, 3 cases from Vietnam and Australia each, 2 cases from Cameroon, Korea, South Africa, Ukraine and Canada each, and 1 case from Thailand, Switzerland, Zimbabwe, Liberia, Austria, China, France, UK and Japan each. Of them, three cases temporarily reside and receive health services in Mongolia.

Mongolia has diagnosed 43.5% of estimated HIV cases, has provided ART to 92.8% of diagnosed cases, and has achieved viral suppression in 94.5% of the treated cases.

CHAPTER 4. ASSESSMENT FINDINGS

4.1 Total expenditure

Mongolia spent 20,908,866.3 thousand MNT on national HIV/AIDS response in 2014-2016. Specifically, total AIDS spending was 5,377,641.0 thousand MNT in 2014, 7,210,829.9 thousand MNT in 2015, and 8,320,395.4 thousand MNT in 2016. In other words, AIDS spending increased by 34.1 percent in 2015 compared to the previous year and by 15.4 percent in 2016 compared to the preceding year in absolute terms.

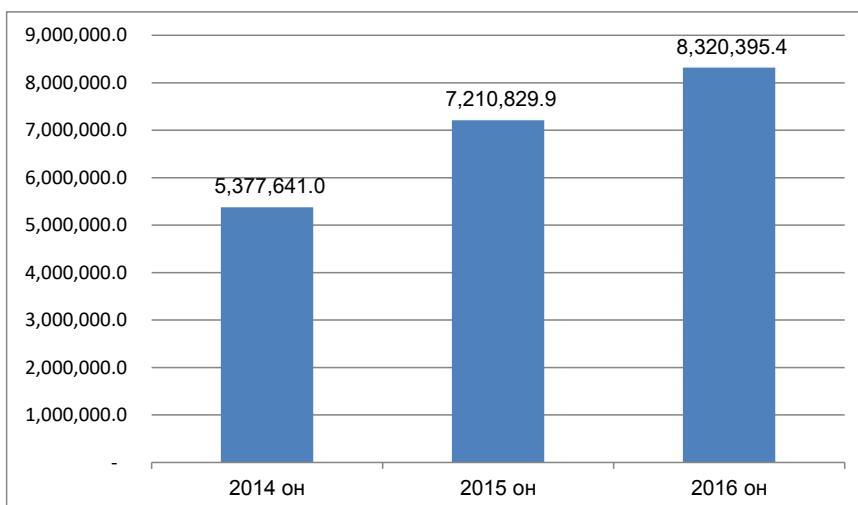


Figure 4.1 Total expenditure on HIV/AIDS response (2014-2016), thousand MNT

4.2 Financing sources

Sources of financing of HIV/AIDS response are classified as follows:

1. Public funds (including financing from the state and local budgets)
2. International funds (including financing from international development partners, international non-profit organizations and foundations such as the Global Fund, WHO and other UN agencies)
3. Private funds (including private hospital/organization funds and personal costs)

In 2014-2016 national HIV/AIDS response was financed mainly from public funds (51.2 percent), followed by international funds (39.7 percent) and private funds (9.1 percent).

Total expenditure on HIV/AIDS response by financing sources is shown in Table 4.1.

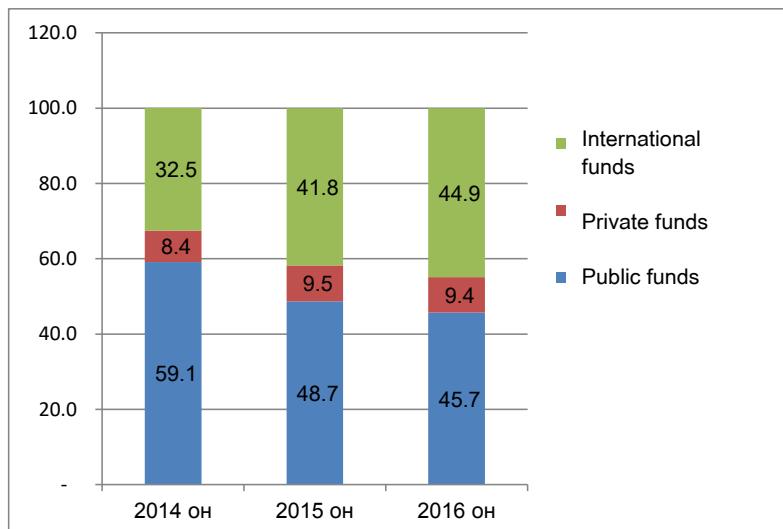

Financing of national HIV/AIDS response from public funds increased 2.4 times in 2016 compared to 2010.

Although the share of financing from private funds is the lowest, it should be noted that out-of-pocket costs borne by individuals and households are not included in the assessment.

International partners and projects continue to finance a significant share of costs associated with HIV response.

4.3 Financing agents

Financing agent is an entity, which receives funds from financing sources and disburses them to providers of health and other services. In this assessment financing agents are classified as follows:

1. Public sector (includes central government and local administration)

2. Private sector/individuals (includes households, individuals and private organizations)

3. International purchasing organizations (including financing from international development partners, international non-profit organizations and foundations such as the Global Fund, WHO and other UN agencies)

Total HIV/AIDS expenditure by financing agents is shown in Table 4.2.

Public sector is the largest financing agent of national HIV/AIDS response. According to the data for the most recent three years 84.9 percent of total financing was consolidated and disbursed by public sector, followed by private sector (9.1 percent) and international purchasing organizations (5.9 percent).

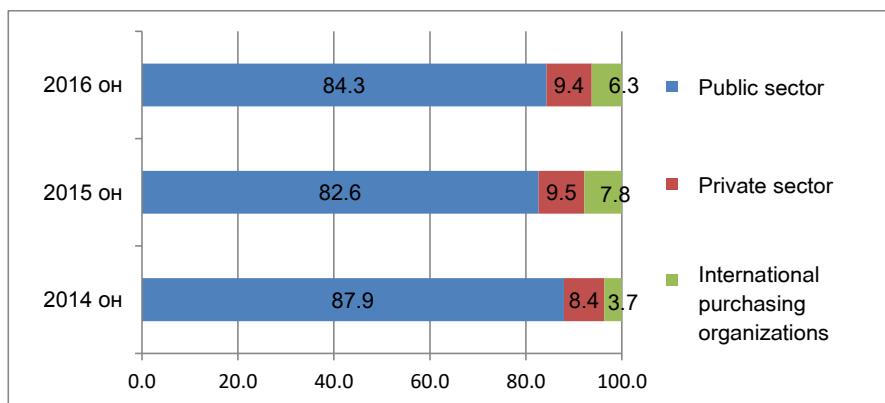


Figure 4.3 National AIDS spending by financing agents (percent)

Total expenditure on national HIV/AIDS response by financing sources and agents is shown in Table 4.3. This table demonstrates the amount of financing received by different financing agents from each of financing sources for the disbursement to providers of services.

The table demonstrates that all public funds are managed by the public sector and all private funds are channeled through the private sector. However, international funds are managed by the public sector and international purchasing agents.

On average, 85.3 percent of international funds was channeled through the public sector and 14.7 percent – through international purchasing agents in the past three years.

4.4 Providers of services

Providers of HIV/AIDS services include public and private hospitals/organizations. Public hospitals/organizations include hospitals and other organizations financed from the state budget. Private hospitals/organizations include private hospitals and non-profit private organizations.

Breakdown of total HIV/AIDS expenditures by providers of services is shown in Table 4.4.

A greater share (67.4 percent) of HIV/AIDS financing is allocated to public sector providers such as specialized health centers, provincial and district general hospitals and primary health centers.

All public funds were spent for public sector providers in 2014-2016. Similarly, all private funds were channeled to private sector providers. In contrast, 58.9 percent of international funds were spent for public and 41.1 percent – for private sector providers in 2014. However, in 2015-2016 private sector

providers received the bulk (65.8 percent) of international funds.

In absolute terms, public and private sector providers of HIV/AIDS services received 13.8 and 7.0 billion MNT, respectively, in 2014-2016.

Breakdown of total HIV/AIDS expenditures by financing agents and providers of services is shown in Table 4.6.

Public sector providers received almost all (97.6 percent) of their funding from the public sector financing agents. Private sector providers received 57.2 percent of their funding from public sector financing agents, 29.5 percent – from private sector financing agents and 13.3 percent – from international purchasing organizations.

4.5 Production factor

Expenditures on HIV/AIDS response are classified according to production factor into current and capital expenditures.

Current expenditures include wages, drug and medical supply costs, training costs and other service costs. Capital expenditures include equipment procurement costs.

In the past three years current expenditures accounted for the overwhelm-

ing majority (98.2 percent) of expenditures and capital expenditures accounted for only 1.8 percent of total costs. Total expenditure on national HIV/AIDS response by production factor is shown in Table 4.7.

All public and private funds for all reporting years were spent on current expenditures only, while 95.9 percent of international funds was spent on current expenditures and 4.1 percent – on capital expenditures. Total expenditure on national HIV/AIDS response by production factor and financing source is shown in Table 4.8.

Largest part (84.7 percent) of current expenditures is disbursed to providers of services via public sector, followed by private sector (9.3 percent) and international purchasing organizations (6.0 percent).

Almost all (99.4 percent) capital expenditures are managed by public sector, and only 0.4 percent – by international purchasing organizations.

Public sector accounted for 67.5 percent and private sector – for 32.5 percent of current expenditures in the past three years. As for capital expenditures, private sector accounted for 73.5 percent of the expenditures in 2014-2015, but the share decreased to 13.2 percent in 2016. In other words, public sector managed 86.8 percent of capital expenditures in 2016.

4.6 Spending categories

Spending on HIV/AIDS prevention and control is classified into the following 7 categories:

ASC 1. Prevention. This category includes the following interventions:

- Communication for social and behavior change
- Risk-reduction for vulnerable and accessible populations
- Prevention – youth in school
- Prevention of HIV transmission aimed at people living with HIV
- Prevention programmes for sex workers and their clients
- Programmes for men who have sex with men
- Harm-reduction programmes for injecting drug users
- Condom social marketing
- Prevention, diagnosis and treatment of sexually transmitted infections
- Blood safety
- Prevention activities not broken down by intervention

ASC 2. Care and treatment. This category includes the following interventions:

- Outpatient care
- Care and treatment services not broken down by intervention

ASC 4. Programme management and administration. This category includes the following interventions:

- Planning, coordination, and programme management
- Monitoring and evaluation
- Upgrading and construction of infrastructure
- Programme management and administration not broken down

ASC 5. Human resources. This category includes the following interventions:

- Training
- Human resources not broken down

ASC 6. Enabling environment. This category includes the following interventions:

- Advocacy
- Enabling environment not broken down

ASC 7. HIV-related research. This category includes the following interventions:

- Epidemiological research

Preventive services consumed the greatest share of financing for HIV/AIDS national response. During the period of 2014-2016, 83.9 percent of financing was spent on prevention, 7.3 percent – on care and treatment, 6.5percent – on programme management and administration, 1.1 percent – on human resources, 0.9percent – on strengthening enabling environment, and 0.4 percent – on HIV-related research.

Breakdown of total HIV/AIDS expenditures by spending categories and financing sources has revealed that public funds were spent mainly on prevention and treatment, and public funds were spent only on prevention. In the past three years 90.5 percent of public funds was spent on prevention and 9.5 percent – on care and treatment, while all private funds were spent on prevention. As for international funds, 83.9 percent of funds was spent on prevention, 7.4 percent – on care and treatment, 6.5 percent – on programme management and administration, 1.1 percent – on human resources, 0.9 percent – on enabling environment, and 0.4 percent – on HIV-related research.

As mentioned earlier, preventive services consumed the greatest share of financing for HIV/AIDS national response and were disbursed to the providers of services via the public sector. In the past three years 83.8 percent of funding for prevention was channeled through the public sector. Similarly, 100 percent of funding for treatment and HIV-related research, 90.1 percent of funding for enabling environment, 87.7 percent of financing for programme management and administration, and 28.7 percent of funding for human resources were disbursed to the providers of services through the public sector.

Private funds were spent on prevention only and were disbursed to the providers of services fully through the public sector.

In contrast, 71.3 percent of financing for human resources, 16.9 percent of financing for prevention and 12.3 percent of financing for programme management and administration were channeled through international purchasing organizations. Total expenditure on national HIV/AIDS response by spending categories and financing agents is shown in Table 4.13.

Breakdown of total HIV/AIDS expenditures by spending categories and providers of services has revealed that activities related to prevention, programme management and administration, and enabling environment were implemented jointly by public and private sector providers. Public sector providers played leading role in provision of services related to prevention, care and treatment, programme management and administration, and human resources. In contrast, private sector providers were more active in enhancing enabling environment. Specifically, 62.8 percent of preventive services and 95.5 percent of activities related to programme management and administration were implemented by public sector providers, while 90.1 percent of activities related to enhancing enabling environment were implemented by private sector providers in the past three years (2014-2016). Public sector providers were fully responsible for treatment and HIV-related research. Table 4.14 shows total expenditure on national HIV/AIDS response by spending categories and providers of services.

Expenditure reports for 2012-2013 have demonstrated that current expenditure accounted for the greatest share of costs, and spending on programme management and administration included a small amount of capital expenditure.

The situation has changed in 2015-2016, and capital expenditure was incurred not only by programme management and administration, but also by prevention category of spending. Nonetheless, current expenditure continued to account for the greatest share of total costs. Overall, capital expenditure comprised only 1.8 percent of total expenditure in the past three years (2014-2016).

Breakdown of current expenditure by spending categories shows that prevention and treatment account for 84.1 and 7.4 percent of current expenditure, respectively.

4.7 Beneficiary populations

Beneficiary populations include people living with HIV (regardless of having a medical/clinical diagnosis of AIDS), most-at-risk populations, other key populations, specific “accessible” populations, general population and non-targeted interventions.

People living with HIV (regardless of having a medical/clinical diagnosis of AIDS) include the following groups:

- People living with HIV not broken down by age or gender

Most-at-risk populations include the following groups:

- Injecting drug users (IDU) and their sexual partners
- Sex workers (SW) and their clients
- Men who have sex with men (MSM)

Other key populations include the following groups:

- Migrants/mobile populations

- Prisoners and other institutionalized persons
- Recipients of blood or blood products

Specific “accessible” populations include the following groups:

- People attending STI clinics
- High school students
- University/college students
- Healthcare workers
- Specific “accessible” populations not broken down by type

General population includes the following groups:

- Youth aged 15-24 years
- General population not broken down by age or gender

Non-targeted interventions are not broken down by type.

More than a half (52.6 percent) of total expenditures on HIV response was spent on specific “accessible” populations in the past three years. Expenditures on general population and most-at-risk populations accounted for 15.9 percent of total expenditures each.

Breakdown of current expenditure by beneficiary populations and financing sources shows that 65.1 percent of public funds spent on specific "accessible" populations, 25.4 percent – on general population, 9.5 percent – on people living with HIV in the past three years.

Similarly, the largest part (99.1 percent) of private funds is spent on specific "accessible" populations and 0.9 percent – on general population.

In terms of international funds, 39.4 percent is spent on most-at-risk populations, 25.1 percent – on specific "accessible" populations, 18.8 percent – on non-targeted interventions, 8.3 percent – on general population, 6.6percent – on other key populations, and 1.7percent – on people living with HIV.

Breakdown of current expenditure by beneficiary populations and financing agents shows that 84.9 percent of funds reached beneficiary populations through public sector, 9.1 percent – through private sector and 5.9 percent – through international purchasing organizations in the past three years.

All (100 percent) funding for people living with HIV and other key populations, 91.3 percent of funding for most-at-risk populations, 95.1 percent of funding for general population, 88.2 percent of funding for non-targeted interventions, and 76.8 percent of funding for specific “accessible” populations were channeled through public sector in the past three years (Figure 4.3).

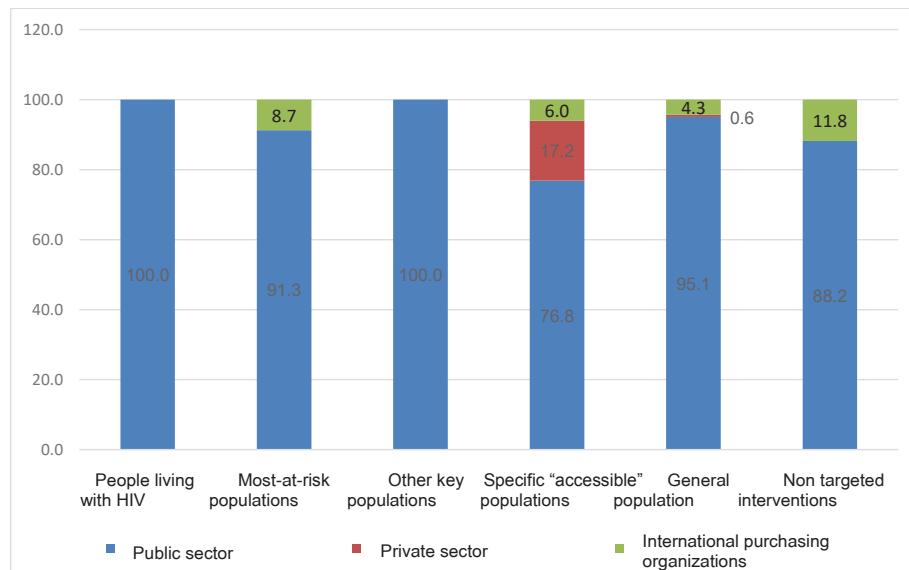


Figure 4.4 Spending by beneficiary populations and financing agents, percent (average of three years)

Breakdown of current expenditure by beneficiary populations and providers of services shows that public sector providers spent 59.5 percent of funds to provide services to specific “accessible” populations, 22.3 percent – to general population, 9.9 percent – to non-targeted interventions, 7.3 percent – to people living with HIV, 0.6 percent – to most-at-risk populations, and 0.5 percent – to other key populations in the past three years.

In contrast, private sector providers spent 46.6 percent of funds to provide services to most-at-risk populations, 39.9 percent – to specific “accessible” populations, 7.6 percent – to other key populations, 2.2 percent – to non-targeted interventions, 2.0 percent – to people living with HIV, and 1.7 percent – to general population in the past three years.

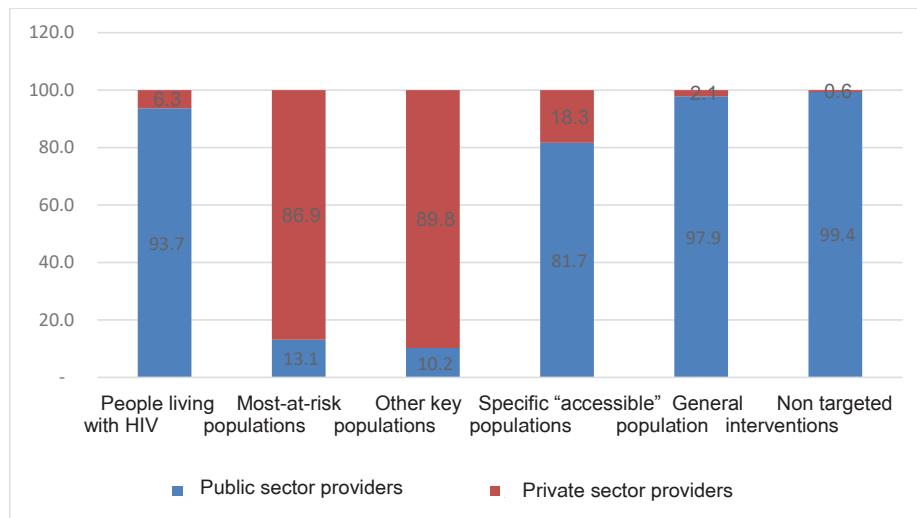


Figure 4.5. Total expenditure on HIV/AIDS response by beneficiary populations and providers of services, percent (average of three years)

Furthermore, 99.4 percent of total expenditure on non-targeted interventions, 97.9 percent of total expenditure on general population, 93.7 percent of total expenditure on people living with HIV and 81.7 percent of total expenditure on specific “accessible” populations were spent by public sector providers in the past three years. In other words, these beneficiary populations seek services predominantly from the public sector providers. In contrast, most-at-risk populations and other key populations tend to seek services from private sector providers, who account for 89.8 percent of expenditure on other key populations and 86.9 percent of expenditure on most-at-risk populations (Figure 4.5).

Breakdown of current expenditure by beneficiary populations and spending categories shows that prevention for specific “accessible” populations accounted for 60.6 percent of total expenditure on prevention in the past three years. Share of spending on most-at-risk populations and general population in the total expenditure on prevention was 18.6 and 17.1 percent, respectively.

In the past three years 81.4 percent of expenditure on treatment was incurred by people living with HIV, and 95.1 percent of administrative costs was spent on non-targeted interventions. Financing for human resources was spent on specific “accessible” populations, and financing for HIV-related research and enabling environment was spent on non-targeted interventions only.

Breakdown of current expenditure by beneficiary populations and production factors has demonstrated that 52.7 percent of current expenditure was spent on specific “accessible” populations, 16.1 percent – on general population, 15.6 percent – on most-at-risk populations, 7.3 percent – on non-targeted interventions, 5.7 percent – on people living with HIV, and 2.5 percent – on other key populations in the past three years.

Regarding capital expenditure 49.8percent was spent on most-at-risk populations, 28.8percent – on non-targeted interventions, 18.4 percent – on specific “accessible” populations, 2.5percent – on other key populations, and 0.5percent – on people living with HIV in the past three years.

CHAPTER 5. CONCLUSIONS

1. National AIDS spending for 2014-2016 was estimated according to financing sources, financing agents, providers of services, spending categories and beneficiary populations.
2. A total of 20,908,866.3 thousand MNT was spent on national AIDS response in 2014-2016 in Mongolia.
3. National AIDS spending was 5,377,641.0 thousand MNT in 2014, 7,210,829.9 thousand MNT in 2015, and 8,320,395.4 thousand MNT in 2016. In absolute terms AIDS spending increased by 34.1 percent in 2015 compared to the preceding year and by 15.4 percent in 2016 compared to the preceding year.
4. International partner-funded programmes and projects were the main financing source of AIDS response in the country. They accounted for 62 percent of total AIDS spending in 2008-2009.
5. In 2014-2016 national HIV/AIDS response was financed mainly from public funds (51.2 percent), followed by international funds (39.7 percent) and private funds (9.1 percent). Financing of national HIV/AIDS response from public funds increased 2.4 times in 2016 compared to 2010.
6. The Global Fund was by far the largest international financing source accounting for 85.3 percent of international funds.
7. Public sector is the largest financing agent of national HIV/AIDS response. This remained true during all reporting years. According to the data for the most recent three years 84.9 percent of total financing was consolidated and disbursed by public sector.
8. In 2010-2011 more than 90 percent of AIDS response funds were disbursed directly to service providers without the involvement of financing agents. However, the situation had changed in 2012-2013, thereby the majority of funds were channeled through the public sector.
9. A greater share (61.8-78.2 percent) of HIV/AIDS financing is allocated to public sector providers. Nonetheless, the share of funding spent by public hospitals/organizations is decreasing year on year. For instance, 78.2 percent of total financing was spent by public hospitals/organizations in 2014 compared to 62.2 percent in 2015 and 61.8 percent in 2016.
10. All public funds were spent for public sector providers. Similarly, all private funds were channeled to private sector providers. This remained true for all reporting years. In contrast, international funds had been spent predominantly for private sector providers since 2015.
11. In absolute terms, public and private sector providers of HIV/AIDS services received 13.8 and 7.0 billion MNT, respectively, in 2014-2016.

12. In the past three years current expenditures accounted for the overwhelming majority (98.2 percent) of expenditures and capital expenditures accounted for only 1.8 percent of total costs. In comparison, capital expenditures accounted for 0.5 percent of total costs in 2012-2013.
13. All public and private funds for all reporting years were spent on current expenditures only, while a certain share international funds was spent on capital expenditures. The bulk of capital spending was allocated to private hospitals/organizations in 2014-2015, and shifted to public hospitals/organizations since 2016.
14. Preventive services consumed the greatest share of financing for HIV/AIDS national response. During the period of 2014-2016, 83.9 percent of financing was spent on prevention, 7.3 percent – on care and treatment, 6.5 percent – on programme management and administration, 1.1 percent – on human resources, 0.9 percent – on strengthening enabling environment, and 0.4 percent – on HIV-related research.
15. Spending on prevention and programme management increased, while spending on care/treatment and human resources decreased year on year. For instance care and treatment accounted for 13.2 percent of total spending in 2014 compared to 4.6 percent in 2015 and 4.3 percent in 2016. Furthermore, no funding had been allocated to HIV-related research since 2014.
16. More than a half (52.6 percent) of total expenditures on HIV response was spent on specific “accessible” populations. This group includes people attending STI clinics, high school students, university/college students and healthcare workers. Expenditures on general population and most-at-risk populations accounted for 15.9 percent of total expenditures each.

CHAPTER 6. RECOMMENDATIONS

Mongolia has undertaken an assessment of spending on national HIV/AIDS response since 2010. The first National AIDS Spending Assessment (NASA) report focusing on expenditures in 2008-2009 was published and disseminated to decision-makers and relevant governmental and non-governmental organizations (NGO) in 2010. The current report summarizes the findings of the fourth NASA. However, it is not clear how the findings of the assessment are used in decision-making and budget planning.

Therefore, it is recommended to compare the assessment findings to similar studies conducted in other countries, and to use in decision-making related to HIV/AIDS policy and financing.

International partner-funded programmes and projects remain the main financing source of AIDS response in the country. Public financing of AIDS response is increasing year on year, and efforts should be made to further maintain this growth.
